

THE UNITED STATES IS IN THE MIDST OF A DRUG EPIDEMIC. The number of Connecticut families affected by the current epidemic continues to rise at an alarming rate. In 2012, 86 Connecticut residents died a heroin related death. In 2015, 723 people died from drug overdoses and 415 of those deaths (57%) involved heroin. Since 2012, the number of heroin-related deaths has increased by 383%! On average, two people die of a drug overdose every day in Connecticut and more people die from overdoses than in car accidents or by gunshot.

Across the United States nearly 88,000 people die from alcohol-related causes annually, making alcohol the fourth leading preventable cause of death in the United States. In Connecticut in 2015, alcohol-impaired driving fatalities accounted for 103 of the 266 traffic fatalities (39 percent of overall driving fatalities). According to a 2012 study, more than 10 percent of U.S. children live with a parent who abuses alcohol.





"Addiction affects every social class, every race, every ethnicity, from your neighbor, to your neighbor's kids, to the homeless, and in every community of Connecticut. When people come for treatment and care, it starts with hope. They have faith and hope that this is the right time. They need to be surrounded by other people that can help them, guide them, and to give them that nudge. Donors to the Archbishop's Annual Appeal are the lifeblood that keep us in place. They literally are the faith and hope and they're the support, they're the beginning of the path way to recovery."

FAMILY LIFE — Since 1997, the Vicariate Outreach Program has distributed more than \$14 million, thanks to the extraordinary generosity of Appeal donors. Last year, more than \$1 million was allocated to parish-identified charities in Hartford, New Haven and Litchfield counties. This funding provided support to families and individuals for life's basic necessities: a warm meal, a bag of groceries and a place to sleep. ImmaCare, Food Share, Mercy Housing and Shelter Corporation, and South Park Inn - Homeless Shelter are four of the Hartford area charities that put your Appeal gift to great use.

Additionally, the Archbishop's Annual Appeal helps fund *Family Centers* operated by Catholic Charities throughout the Archdiocese which take a two-generational approach to preventing poverty by optimizing support for families and children. In Hartford, Asylum Hill Family Center provides programs that aid families in crisis – families facing eviction, have nothing to eat, or are looking for employment. Not only does staff attempt to solve the immediate problem, but they look to determine the cause. Through a variety of parent engagement programs, such as the Parent Ambassadors initiative, families are educated and empowered to be their own best advocate. Moureen Bish, Program Director, says that with funding from the Appeal, "*We're able to remove some of these barriers for families*, so they can resolve the immediate crises and focus on being their child's best teacher."

VOCATIONS — Can you imagine life without Priests? Our priests are there for the most joyous times in our lives and they offer



strength during the saddest times as well. The Office of Vocations for the Archdiocese of Hartford is committed to fostering quality, faith-filled and lasting vocations to the priesthood. There are currently nineteen men in formation for priesthood in the Archdiocese of Hartford. Three are scheduled to be ordained in May of 2017. It is through the Office of Vocations that young men discerning the priesthood can find financial and spiritual support needed during their formation process. Reverend Jeffrey Gubbiotti, Director of Vocations, conveyed, "We are so grateful to all the donors to the Archbishop's Annual Appeal for supporting our work in the Vocations Office and for allowing our seminarians to freely discern what God's plan is for them in their lives.
